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CHAPTER 34.

BOY SCOUTS ASSOCIATION.

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A LAW TO REGULATE THE ACTIVITIES OF BOY SCOUTS
IN CYPRUS.

1947 Cap. 50.

[10th March, 1933.]

Whereas by the Royal Charter of its incorporation granted on the fourth day of January, 1912, the Boy Scouts Association is *inter alia* empowered to develop its activities in the British Overseas Dominions :

And whereas it is expedient to make statutory provision for the more assured exercise of such power and for the furtherance and protection of the purposes of the said Association in Cyprus and for the prevention of the establishment of unauthorized Boy Scouts Associations :

Be it therefore enacted :—

Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Boy Scouts Association Law.

Interpretation.

2. In this Law,

“ the Association ” means the Boy Scouts Association incorporated under the Royal Charter granted on the fourth day of January, 1912, and includes the Cyprus Boy Scouts Association formed under the constitution of the Association ;

“ boy scout ” means a boy scout recognized as such
