CHAPTER 167.

ENGLISH SCHOOL.

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A LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND CONTROL
OF THE ENGLISH SCHOOL.

[6th December, 1935.]

Whereas the Reverend Frank Darvall Newham, Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Master of Arts, Honorary Canon of St. George's Cathedral, Jerusalem, (in this Law called "the Grantor" which expression, where the context so admits, shall include his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns) founded in the year 1900 at Nicosia an educational establishment known as the English School (in this Law called "the English School"):

And whereas the Grantor has at his own cost and expense maintained and managed the English School since the date of its foundation and has endowed it with property of considerable value:

And whereas by an Indenture dated the 12th day of May, 1930, (in this Law called "the Indenture"), it was agreed to the effect following, that is to say—

- (a) that in consideration of the sum of six thousand pounds to be paid to the Grantor by a Board of Trustees therein named (in this Law called "the Board") the Grantor would grant and convey to the Board all the immovable property described in the Indenture;
- (b) that the Grantor would, upon payment of the said sum of six thousand pounds, deliver to the

Board all the movable property forming the furniture and equipment of the English School;

- (c) that, upon payment of the said sum of six thousand pounds, the Board should take over the management and control of the English School and should manage and control the same in manner prescribed by the Indenture:

And whereas the immovable property described in the Indenture has been conveyed to and is now vested in the Board:

And whereas out of the said sum of six thousand pounds a sum of four thousand and five hundred pounds has been paid to the Grantor by the Board:

And whereas the Grantor and the Board desire to place the English School on a more permanent foundation for the benefit of the youth of the Colony:

And whereas the Governor has paid to the Grantor the sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds, being the balance of the said sum of six thousand pounds due to the Grantor:

And whereas the Grantor, the Board and the Governor have agreed that the said movable and immovable property and the management and control of the English School should vest in the Governor:

And whereas doubts have arisen as to the proper mode of vesting the said movable and immovable property and the management and control of the English School in the Governor:

Be it therefore enacted:—

1. This Law may be cited as the English School (Management and Control) Law. Short title.

2. (1) The ownership of the immovable property now standing registered in the name of the Board under two Certificates of Registration bearing numbers 510 and 606, and dated the 15th day of November, 1930, is hereby vested in the Governor, and the Director of Lands and Surveys is hereby empowered to register the said immovable property in the name of the Governor. (2) Subject to the provisions of section 5, the Governor may at any time after registration thereof in his name sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of the said immovable property or any part thereof.
