- (2.) A permit for a procession shall prescribe the routes by which and the times at which such procession may pass, and the conditions subject to which such procession may take place.
- (3.) A permit for a procession shall be issued to one or more persons by name, the words "and others" being added after such person or persons' name or names.
- (4.) The person or persons so named shall be responsible for the due observance of all the conditions of the permit, and shall, if so required, furnish such security for the observance of such conditions as the Commissioner may require.
 - (5.) The Commissioner may cancel or withdraw any such permit.
- 4. Any person committing a breach of this Law or of the con-Penalty. ditions of any permit for a procession shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding three months or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to both such fine and imprisonment, without prejudice to any sum payable by virtue of any security given by or on behalf of such person in pursuance of section 3.
- 5. Nothing in this Law contained shall prevent a prosecution Saving. for an offence under any other law, but so that a person shall not be punished twice for the same offence.

- 1. In this Law, "Premises" means any house, shop, khan, Definition. store, warehouse, bath, mill, stable or shed, with the appurtenances thereto.
- 2. Whenever the term or interest of the tenant of any premises Notice to quit held by him at will, or for any term not exceeding two years, either to be served on tenant.
