Background

• Terms of Reference of the Legal and Technical Working Group:

3. Functions

The Legal Working Group and Technical Working Group shall:

- (1) further improve the draft text of the regional arrangement as a potential intergovernmental agreement, [Done]
- (2) prepare a draft road map for the implementation of substantive provisions in the draft text and
- (3) perform any other tasks directed by the Steering Group.
- Primary responsibility for development of the draft road map is with the Technical Working Group (TWG)
 - 8 virtual TWG meetings held between April 2016 and February 2017
 - Supported by UNNExT experts and ESCAP Secretariat

(1) Draft road map

- Builds on earlier deliberations of the Interim Intergovernmental Steering Group (IISG), including background documents
- Purpose: To better inform Member States of the individual and joint actions they may take after they become Parties to the Framework Agreement
 - The draft road map specifies actions related to each of the articles 6 to 14, tasks, implementation ownership and timeline.
 - No specific timeline is provided for actions and tasks to be performed by individual Parties since each Party is expected to <u>set</u> its implementation timeline based on its own readiness assessment and national priorities - as well as resource availability
- A number of supporting documents are listed in the annex with indication of their delivery status
