Electronic Exchange of SPS Certificates for Better Trade Control and Facilitation

21-22 October 2015, Wuhan, China

Background:

An increasing number of countries have been seeking to replace the traditional paper-based sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) certificates with electronic certificates. There are important benefits in doing so for exporters, importers and regulatory agencies. Electronic SPS (e-SPS) certificates can help reduce fraud and better manage the risks associated with trade in agricultural and food products; lower administrative costs and burden of the regulatory authorities; and speed up clearance of agricultural products at borders. A number of global and regional developments provide further impetus for the exchange of electronic sanitary and phytosanitary certificates, including the adoption of the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement and the negotiation of a regional arrangement on the facilitation of cross-border paperless trade. The International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC) has also recently issued guidance to facilitate the global exchange of the electronic phytosanitary certificates.

In that context, the objectives of the workshop are:

- a. To raise awareness amongst policymakers in Asia-Pacific regarding the benefits of exchanging e-SPS certificates;
- b. To provide an overview of the key regional and global initiatives supporting e-SPS exchange;
- c. To exchange information and present relevant case studies from countries, which have implemented or in the process of implementing e-SPS certificates;
- d. To provide guidance and relevant tools to policymakers and practitioners looking to implement in their national contexts.

This workshop is organized by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), in cooperation with the Food and Agriculture Organization Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific and the Asian Development Bank. It is implemented with the support of the United Nations Network of Experts for Paperless Trade and Transport in Asia and the Pacific (UNNExT), a community of knowledge dedicated to building governments' capacity to implement paperless systems for trade facilitation and sustainable development. This workshop will take place as a side event of the 7th Asia-Pacific Trade Facilitation Forum in Wuhan, China.
