Why Institutional Change?

One of the three key factors influencing the degree of achievement of MDGs

Institutions have received relatively less attention in relation to achieving MDG targets

Why Institutional Change? Cont:

- Understand the role that institutions can play in "trickle down " of economic growth as well as service delivery
- n Institutions are also needed to ensure optimal allocation of resources and to improve the quality and responsiveness of public services.

Why Institutional Change? Cont:

- n Institutions provide an *enabling environment* to help deliver services, shape human behaviour, effectively govern, protect human rights, promote inclusion and dispense justice
- Even the best of organizations can accomplish little when institutional bottlenecks hinder their progress

Why Institutional Change? Cont:

Many policies at the local and grass root level become ineffective in the absence of efficient institutions

Lacuna in policy advocacy and development efforts in addressing institutional issues in achieving MDGs



- A complex issue: different definitions
- n institutions as constraints that human beings devise to shape human interaction
- institutions covering formal rules, regulations and structures as well as informal arrangements



	Level	Example
1	Institutions related to the social structure of the society	Mainly informal institutions such as traditions, social norms, and customs
2	Institutions related to <i>rules</i> of the game	Mainly formal rules defining property rights and the judiciary system
3	Institutions related to the <i>play</i> of the game	Rules defining the governance structure of a country and contractual relationships such as business contracts

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
